



WELCOME TO SWTR 2005!

This month's edition of the DATESLINE club newsletter is being included in the packets of the teams participating in the 15th annual South West Tandem Rally. To all those people, we're glad you're here! For most of you, this is welcome back to the South West Tandem Rally. The Dallas Area Tandem Enthusiasts (DATEs) tandem club is pleased to host the SWTR 2005 with some of the best cycling Texas has to offer. Texas is as well known for the displays of wild flowers that bloom here each Spring just as the Appalachian mountains are known for the color of their leaves in the fall. You will be riding through one of the most scenic parts of the state at the peak of the wild flower season.

The Bluebonnet is the state flower and you will see lots of them in bloom. If you don't know what bluebonnet flowers look like, ask anyone around you and they'll be happy to show you which ones are bluebonnets. You will probably discover that you are the only person in shouting range who doesn't know what a bluebonnet is.

You may see people walking out into the flowers and sitting down among them for a picture. You may want to do that, too. Before you engage in that tradition, you need to know about chiggers. They are tiny bugs that are relatives of the tick and they are very likely to be resident in the natural fields of wild flowers. They are so small that you need a microscope to see them and their bite raises red itching welts 12 to 24 hours after you were in the field. They usually seek out and bite in places where clothing fits snugly. If you walk out in a field, wear insect repellent. If you sit, wear lots of it.

We've had a team of experts working tirelessly to pick out some terrific routes for you. (Why they had no tires, I'll never know.) We think the riding in this area provides something for everyone. Who doesn't enjoy sailing down a country road with the air rushing over them on a long steady decent? There are places on some of these routes where you can throw the chain in to the biggest gear set you've got and "spin it out" until you can't keep up with the pedals any more. There are other places where you will get to slow down and check out the flowers as you work your way up an incline to be rewarded with a panoramic view of the Texas hill country. For those of you who like a steady flat grade, well, I call your attention to the portion of Saturday's ride from mile 5.5 to mile 6.5. Enjoy!!

History of the Southwest Tandem Rally

Bill and Deborah Bailey formed the Dallas Area Tandem Enthusiasts, a.k.a. **Double Dates** in 1990. In 1991, they organized the first Southwest Tandem Rally in Waco. I thought Waco was a pretty unlikely place for a tandem rally; yet 15 years later, SWTR has been at Waco more times than any other city. My memory is that 66 teams attended the first rally. Whatever the number, it was more than expected.

The Houston Club, HATS, organized the 1992 rally in Palestine, deep in the East Texas forest. The most memorable feature of this rally was that the restaurant could not accommodate everyone so we ate in shifts. Who could forget the slide show of the bike trip from hell ----the couple who rode from the West Coast back to Texas through miles and miles and miles of desert?

DATES again put on the 1993 rally – once again in East Texas but this time in Nacogdoches. 1993 was the year of the rain – hard rain all day on Saturday. Since we had a large room at the convention center to store bikes, everyone used this to socialize during the day.

1994 - in Brenham organized by HATS. Brenham is famous as the home of Blue Bell Ice Cream. DATES scheduled a pre-rally ride to tour the creamery and the ride began with ominous skies. It was raining when we arrived but no one was prepared for the tornado sirens. While the captains were herded to the auditorium and climbed under the bleachers the stokers paraded to a concrete out-house. We all lived to talk about this – tornado damage was limited to a few downed trees. Who could forget the lime green rally jersey's with "Clarabelle" the cow on the back?

In 1995 we ventured out of Texas for the first time and went across the Red River to Ardmore, Oklahoma. Rick and Kay Watson with the help of a couple of other "Okies" put on the rally without a club to back them up – and did a great job. They had the advantage of Lake Murray State Park, a great location. Who could forget the Native American Indian fancy dancers?

1996 - we returned to Nacogdoches, the oldest town in TX. This time we had great weather and did the rides we missed in 1993.

1997 took us to Tulsa, Oklahoma thanks to the Tulsa Bicycle Club. Elvis WAS in the building and who could forget our friends from Arkansas showing up for Hula Lessons in grass skirts and coconuts on the half shell?

In 1998 Hats took us back to the original SWTR site, Waco. With better routes than the original rally, this was well received.

By 1999, Austin had a tandem club, TxCats, and they discovered one of the best facilities for any of our Texas tandem rallies, T-Bar-M Tennis Ranch in New Braunfels at the Southern edge of the Texas Hill Country. This was the beginning of the bike games. Who could forget Rusty & Roane making us laugh with their skit from Sat. Night Live?

2000 was the 10th anniversary of SWTR and DATES chose Tyler, Texas. Tyler is a larger city than we often use and was a challenge route wise. But good routes were found and a good time had by all. For this rally, a Pre-Tour attracted many people from across the country. At the 2000 rally, the organizing clubs and individuals agreed to a 5-year rotation of sponsorship. Does anyone still wear that shocking pink cycling cap? Who could forget Hans & Franz?

In 2001 we're back in Ardmore at Lake Murray. A small post-tour took us to SW Oklahoma and SE Arkansas. Who could forget our on "Vanna" handing out those fabulous Black & Decker appliances or all those folks being hypnotized?

HATS stayed with a winner in 2002 and took us back to Waco. We experienced the Secret Service and rode by Bush's Crawford Ranch. Who could forget dinner on the bridge over the Brazos River & rest stop at the Coffee Station in downtown Crawford, TX?

The Tulsa Bicycle Club entertains us with Rock & Roll at the 2003 rally. Who could forget the twist contest, ducktails and poodle skirts? They added a week-long post-tour in NE Oklahoma.

In 2004, TX Cats again takes us to New Braunfels. T-Bar-M has expanded their facilities but Saturday's ride is cold and wet. A large number of us end up spending the afternoon at one of Texas' Oldest Dance Halls, the Gruene Hall.

So it's 2005 and the 15th SWTR. To celebrate this anniversary, DATES decided to add a day to the rally, include professional quality jerseys and go to Fredericksburg, the center of TX Hill Country. A pre-tour once again attracts tandem riders from across the country. And we believe we're the first tandem rally ever to offer its own wines, Ranch Road Red and Willow City White.

SWTR had not grown to the size of the North West or Mid West rallies and most of us have no regret over this. I believe smaller rallies are more fun. In some ways I remember the first SWTR the best because I met so many teams who have become great friends. SWTR has registered approximately 125 teams each year since 1993. But the mix of attendees seems to be changing. In the early days most of the riders were from Texas and a couple of surrounding states. This year 43% of the riders are from out of state; we have teams from 25 states and Canada. We even have four teams from New Jersey. I didn't know there were four tandem teams in New Jersey! I hope we get to meet them in Fredericksburg.

John's Birthday Ride Better Late than Never

Seven teams headed out of the Lowe's parking lot at 9:00 on a chilly, overcast Sunday morning to participate in John's Birthday Ride. One more team was still checking tires and donning gear back in the parking lot. But they were very familiar with the route and would have no trouble catching the rest of us. A ninth team was expected, but hadn't shown. But they too were very familiar with the route and wouldn't have any trouble catching us no matter how much of a head start we had.

This is our home route. We ride it very frequently – whenever there isn't a pay ride on Saturday or a DATES ride on Sunday. Surprisingly that makes it both easier and harder to write an article about the ride. My initial thought was "Seven teams showed up and we rode. What more is there to say?" But that's not much of an article. This is where familiarity gets in the way. We do this ride all the time. It's hard to recognize what's special about it that's worthy of mention. So that's what I thought about during the ride. Here's where familiarity helps. When I start asking the question "What makes this a good route" I don't have to go ride it again to come up with an answer. I have it all in my head if I just ask the right question.

This is a really nice route with something to delight everyone: Views of Lake Ray Hubbard on Polly Road and E. Fork Road. Two of the best sets of rollers that I'm aware of in the area. Two of the best cycling roads in the area – the kind I like best – country lanes that twist and wind with hills both up and down and next to no traffic. Two "screamin downhills" – to use John's words. Plenty of animal life – llamas, brahmas, whatever you call those floppy eared cows (and calves), Shetland ponies, guinea hens, pheasant and heron. Even an Alligator Habitat – I'll bet few of you even knew we have such a thing in the Dallas area. And dogs, of course.

LIABILITY RELEASE

All riders must sign a waiver of claim below to become members of Double Dates. Parents or guardians must sign for riders under 18 years of age.

I acknowledge that by signing this document, I am releasing the Double Dates, its members, officers, and agents from liability. This release is a contract with legal consequences, and I have read it carefully before signing.

I acknowledge that cycling is an inherently dangerous sport and fully realize the dangers of participating in group rides. I fully assume the risks associated with such participation.

For myself, my heirs, executors, administrators, legal representatives, assignees, and successors in interest (collectively "Successors"), I hereby waive, release, discharge, hold harmless, promise not to sue, and indemnify the Dallas Area Tandem Enthusiasts, its members, ride leaders and officers (collectively the "Released Parties") from any and all rights and claims including claims arising from the released parties' own negligence, gross negligence or intentional conduct, which I have or which may hereafter accrue to me, and from any and all damages which may be sustained by me directly or indirectly in connection with, or arising out of, my participation in or association with an event sponsored by Dallas Area Tandem Enthusiasts.

I understand and agree that situations may arise during a ride, which may be beyond the immediate control of the leader(s), and I must continually ride so as to endanger neither others nor myself. I accept responsibility for the conditions and adequacy of my own bicycle equipment. I will wear a helmet that satisfies the requirements of the ANSI Snell regulations that can protect against serious head injury, and I assume all responsibility and liability for the selection of such a helmet. I have no physical or medical condition, which to my knowledge would endanger others or myself if I participate in Dallas Area Tandem Enthusiasts rides or would interfere with my ability to participate in such rides. I agree that should I or my successors assert my claim in contravention of this agreement, the asserting party shall be liable for the expenses (including legal fees) incurred by the other party or parties in defending.

I understand that a parent or responsible adult must accompany all riders under the age of 18 on any Dallas Area Tandem Enthusiasts ride. If I am a minor, my parent or guardian also is signing on my behalf and we both agree to be bound by the terms of this waiver and release.
